PLEASE NOTE, FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS DOCUMENT THE TERM "CHILD" REFERS TO PEOPLE UNDER THE AGE OF 18 YEARS

The New South Wales Underwater Hockey Inc. (NSWUWH) is committed to ensuring a safe environment for all of its members, including people less than 18 years of age. We commit to protecting the safety and welfare of children participating in our sport and acknowledge the positive influence that these people have on our sport, both as individuals and as a group.

The New South Wales Underwater Hockey Inc. declares that it has no tolerance for, and will aim to take action against, any of its members who are found to be involved in physical, sexually or emotionally abusing children members of the NSWUWH.

The NSWUWH will elect a Child Protection Officer (CPO) who will oversee issues relating to Child Protection within the NSWUWH.

NSWUWH requires all clubs within New South Wales to elect a Club CPO who will oversee implementation and administration of the NSWUWH Child Protection Policy.

Members of the NSWUWH must comply with the Australian Underwater Hockey Code of Conduct as dictated by the Australian Underwater Federation (AUF), particularly as it pertains to issues surrounding children (appendix 1).

All paid employees or volunteers who hold a child-related position within NSWUWH must submit a form to the NSW Inc. For Children and Young People for a Working with Children Check (WWCC) and meet the requirements of this check. The WWCC will be overseen by the NSWUWH CPO.

Employees or volunteers who must undergo screening are at the discretion of the CPO of that club and should include but not be limited to:

- All Child Protection Officers
- Coaches of teams that have members who are under 18 years of age
- Those who have direct unsupervised contact with children

MANAGEMENT OF ALLEGATIONS:

In keeping with New South Wales law, anyone who suspects, on reasonable grounds, that a child or young person is at risk of being neglected or physically, sexually or emotionally abused, should report it to Community Services. Where this involves children associated with NSWUWH, New South Wales Underwater Hockey Inc. should be informed of this action (ideally through NSWUWH or the Club CPO).

Allegations will be overseen by the NSWUWH CPO in accordance with the AUF Policy for Confidential Record of Child Abuse Allegation (appendix 3).

PART B: CODES OF BEHAVIOUR

- Operate within the rules and spirit of our sports, promoting fair play over winning at any
 cost.
- Encourage and support opportunities for people to learn appropriate behaviours and skills
- Support opportunities for participation in all aspects of the sport.
- · Treat each person as an individual.
- Display control and courtesy to all involved with the sport.
- Respect the rights and worth of every person regardless of their gender, ability, cultural background or religion.
- Respect the decisions of officials, coaches and administrators in the conduct of the sport.
- Wherever practical, avoid unaccompanied and unobserved one-on-one activity (when in a supervisory capacity or where a power imbalance will exist) with people under the age of 18 years.
- Adopt appropriate and responsible behaviour in all interactions.
- Adopt responsible behaviour in relation to alcohol and other drugs.
- Act with integrity and objectivity, and accept responsibility for your decisions and actions.
- Ensure your decisions and actions contribute to a safe environment.
- Ensure your decisions and actions contribute to a harassment free environment.
- Do not tolerate harmful or abusive behaviours.

Athletes

- Give your best at all times.
- Participate for your own enjoyment and benefit.

Coaches

- Place the safety and welfare of the athletes above all else.
- Help each person (athlete, official etc) reach their potential respect the talent, developmental stage and goals of each person and compliment and encourage with positive and supportive feedback.
- Any physical contact with a person should be appropriate to the situation and necessary for the person's skill development.
- Be honest and do not allow your qualifications to be misrepresented.

Officials

- Place the safety and welfare of the athletes above all else.
- Be consistent and impartial when making decisions.
- Address unsporting behaviour and promote respect for all people.

NEW SOUTH WALES

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Administrators

- Act honestly, in good faith and in the best interests of the sport as a whole.
- Ensure that any information acquired or advantage gained from the position is not used improperly.
- Conduct your responsibilities with due care, competence and diligence.
- Do not allow prejudice, conflict of interest or bias to affect your objectivity.

Parents


- Encourage children to participate and have fun.
- Focus on the child's effort and performance rather than winning or losing.
- Never ridicule or yell at a child for making a mistake or losing a competition.

Spectators

- Respect the performances and efforts of all people.
- Reject the use of violence in any form, whether it is by spectators, coaches, officials or athletes.
